About the seminar

Anthropology encompasses the study of people throughout the world, their evolutionary history, how they behave, adapt to different environments, communicate and socialize with one another. The explosive expansion of anthropology is startling as it appeared to attract a large number of interested individuals to its medically focused sub discipline. The discipline distinguished itself from other sciences, using a holistic and multifaceted approach concerning biological, evolutionary, linguistic and social aspects of a population, and especially the tribal population groups which are

most vulnerable in the context of health and development. Interest of the discipline varies widely from the study of ancient DNA, molecular processes and paleopathology, through explorations of illness experiences, social relationships, and health care settings. Further, anthropological research on evolutionary origins, lifestyles, dietary changes, cardiometabolic risk factors, genetic disorder and sub structuring of Indian populations have shed light on contemporary health issues. Reconstruction of Indian population history based on genetic evidences, genetic diversity of isolated populations, physiological functions environmental stress, bio-archaeology adaptation and variation are important areas in anthropology, for it would not only provide the descriptive of Indian population but will deepen our knowledge on factors responsible for disease susceptibility and will help to undertake genomewide association studies for complex disorders. Health, a complete state of physical and mental well-being has taken an independent and vigorous stand of its own in the discipline of anthropology. Anthropologists working towards contemporary issues pertaining to health and health seeking behaviour have helped in bridging the gap between evolutionary medicine, social epidemiology and public health. They have often acted as cultural mediators, helping to communicate cross cultural understandings of health and illness in order to make public health initiatives more effective for specific groups. Key concern in anthropology of development pertains to upliftment and improvisation of

standard of living. Anthropologists can facilitate developmental schemes envisaged by different agencies in the improvement of the lifestyle of the people. The current seminar, therefore, would form on recent trends in anthropology, issues related to health system research and development and the future perspectives.

About the Department

In 1947, the Department of Anthropology came up in the Faculty of Science at the University of Delhi, with Dr. P.C. Biswas as its founder head. It was the second University Department in the country. Currently the Department consists of nineteen faculty members and a number of research associates, DST women scientists, research fellows and scholars including JRF and SRF. The Department has had the privilege of hosting a large number of visiting faculties over the years which has contributed in its development as one of the foremost centers of Anthropological teaching and research in the world.

Several branches of Anthropology have been exclusively taught to the students by our faculty members. Apart from Undergraduate Honors course in Anthropology, PG course in Anthropology and certificate course in Forensic Science, a full-time PG course in Forensic Science was also introduced in the year 2015.

The students here are encouraged to participate in various debates, seminars, workshops and symposiums which are organized time to time in the Department and they are also motivated to

present their work in various national and international Universities.
